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MESSAGE FROM THE ECO PRESIDENT 2022-2023

2022: A Wealth of New Opportunities

When I look back on my first year as president, I feel a profound sense of privilege to be part of the European Cancer Organisation (ECO). I've been overwhelmed by the level of commitment from all our member societies, patient groups, and focused topic networks.

So many of you invest so much time and effort – selflessly – in our relentless fight against this devastating disease.

I must confess that when I began my tenure, I found it particularly challenging – especially following on the heels of our former president and dear friend, Matti Aapro. However, I strongly believe that with a clear vision and your ongoing support and collaboration, we made significant strides in 2022.

For example, together we made a strategic decision to not only promote the EU Beating Cancer Plan but to become actively involved it its implementation. It began in June with the launch of our first EU-funded project. INTERACT-EUROPE has been a huge success building the curriculum and teaching modules for a novel programme for professionals in oncology. This much-needed effort breaks down barriers among different cancer disciplines and professions by bringing together medical oncologists, radiologists, surgeons, nurses, and pharmacists to learn how to better work together. As an oncology nurse, I know that the more interaction and understanding we have of each other – and each other's specific roles – the better care we can provide our patients.

Since the launch of INTERACT-EUROPE, we are now leading or actively contributing to 17 EU funded projects. This is a major achievement, and it comes at the request of our member societies. This is a once-in-a generation opportunity for the cancer community in terms of political leadership,

cross-border funding, and ECO's ability to convene and coordinate a wide range of stakeholders.

Among the many other milestones recorded last year, I am particularly pleased by the ECO General Assembly's decision to establish the <u>European Cancer Community Foundation</u>, for launch in 2023. This will provide greater funding opportunities for some of the worthiest programmes and innovative projects which will in turn help better manage and control cancer.

Another ECO first in 2022 was hearing the impressive abstract presentations by <u>young cancer professionals</u> at the European Cancer Summit and ECO's subsequent decision to help them establish their own group within our organisation. These young men and women represent ECO's future, and we are committed to helping them every step of the way.

In 2022, we also saw the strengthening of our collaborations with organisations on both sides of the Atlantic. For example, we began working more closely with WHO Europe, resulting in a Memorandum of Understanding highlighting ECO's role as a non-state actor. We also worked in tandem with the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) on a wide range of topics, also within an MoU framework.

There is so much we achieved in 2022 and I encourage you to read this report to discover some of the many other noteworthy initiatives. I am fully aware, however, that none of these would have been possible without your dedicated support throughout the year.

Strategy 2020-2023

In December 2019, the General Assembly of our (then) 27 Member Societies approved a new Strategy for the period of 2020–2023, launching both our Focused Topic Networks and Community 365 ahead of a new brand and website. Since then, we believe our organisation has grown in relevance and engagement, with more organisations participating in our work and with increases in our number of Member Societies and patient advocacy groups.



Pillar 1: Policy and Advocacy

On behalf of our Member Societies, we strive to be

- a key organisation in the development of onco-policy and advocacy across Europe;
- a valuable resource for European institutions, bringing together different disciplines, professions and patient groups; and
- a respected voice to support and build on the expertise and experience of those Member Societies.

Pillar 2: Convenor and Facilitator around Focused Topics

- We act as the "federation" of the European cancer community - amplifying the important work of our Member Societies and Patient Advisory Committee.
- We convene our Member Societies, patient groups and other stakeholders for discussion and exchange, building consensus and coordinating activities, including through ECO Focused Topic Networks.
- We believe in collaboration, bringing together those who share our mission and vision to work for the benefit of patients, and advocating for our agreed policies across Europe.

New EU Cancer Screening Recommendations: We made it together!

A lot happens in twenty years in almost any field of endeavour. But in the fast-paced world of cancer science and technology, twenty years can sometimes feel more like a century.

That's the way it may have felt waiting for EU's cancer screening recommendations to member states to finally receive a full update. In 2022, it finally occurred – but not without controversy or argument.

Sensibly, in formulating a proposal for update of the cancer screening recommendations, the European Commission made full use of its Scientific Advice Mechanism to construct the best evidence-based recommendations. With its reports published in March 2022 the signals were clear: lung, prostate and gastric cancer merited inclusion alongside breast, colorectal and cervical cancer within the EU's principal advisory document on cancer screening.

Yet not all were in agreement with the scientific advice. Late in the process, as member state representatives met behind closed doors to pour over the wording, ECO became aware of efforts to diminish or even delete key parts of the recommendations.

A spirited coordination of efforts led by ECO's Prevention, Early Detection and Screening Network, quickly followed. Governments, politicians, and other stakeholders were contacted and energised to preserve the strength of the Commission's recommendations

The end result: in December 2022, EU member states delivered a potential early Christmas present to the early detection of cancer. Brand new EU recommendations on cancer screening, covering all six tumour types favoured by Scientific Advice Mechanism.

Now the task is to achieve national implementation of the recommendations. ECO is watching closely.

New policy mandates and recommendations from our community

During 2022, ECO worked with its Member Societies and Patient Advisory Committee to consult, finalise and publish three (3) new Policy Action Reports, and to reply to twelve (12) public consultations. Among the new mandate for ECO advocacy action provided by this activity includes:

- Recommending that assistance to low- and middle- income countries working to eliminate cervical cancer be a key component of EU global health policy, and EU neighbourhood and foreign policy more generally
- Supporting WHO level attention to the cancer co-morbidities and complications agenda
- Urging that public areas where families and children are present, such as healthcare facilities, public parks, beaches, sports stadia and vehicles, be brought into the legal provisions of smokefree environment regulation
- Advocating the extension of current EU tobacco control frameworks to novel and emerging tobacco products
- Setting out implementation needs for the European Health Data Space, including areas of required EU quidelines
- Analysing how Europe's Beating Cancer Plan and the EU Research Mission on Cancer can be deployed to combat inequalities related to men and cancer
- · Proposing improvements to the monitoring and measurement of air pollution

From Brussels to Budapest to Bucharest: inter-connecting Europe's cancer policy

Europe's Beating Cancer Plan raises new challenges, such as better uniting elected representatives from national capitals focused on who dedicate themselves to improving cancer control in their countries. EU cancer policy must connect to national cancer policy if it is to maximise success. This is a key focus of ECO's <u>National and European Parliamentarians for Cancer Action</u>.

To date, 32 politicians from 16 countries are part of this new political network, rapidly sharing information, providing mutual inspiration and encouragement, and providing more national input to EU cancer policy delivery.

The launch of <u>National and European Parliamentarians for Cancer Action</u> in November 2022 is also closely connected to the creation of the <u>European Cancer Pulse</u>, which helps turn data and insights on cancer inequalities into practical political and policy action.

Europe's Beating Cancer Plan: the progress continues

In 2022, with Europe's Beating Cancer Plan already one year old, its implementation accelerated. Milestones included:

- A new EU legal proposal setting out prospective improvements to the regulation and removal of asbestos
- Proposed revisions to bring EU air quality regulations closer into line with WHO standards
- The agreement by 27 member states to a new set of EU Council Recommendations on Cancer Screening
- The publication of the European Cancer Inequalities Registry
- The initiation of the INTERACT-EUROPE project to develop an inter-specialty cancer training programme
- The commencement of the EUCAIM project to deliver a European Cancer Imaging Initiative
- The start of UNCAN.eu to better understand cancer
- The release of a legal proposal to create a European Health Data Space
- The initiation of FU-CAYAS-NET: an FU Network of Youth Cancer Survivors

On behalf of <u>Member Societies</u> and <u>patient advocacy groups</u>, the European Cancer Organisation convenes interested stakeholders around <u>ten important topics</u>, each with its own network.

These dedicated networks have been established to facilitate consensus and joint projects in our <u>Strategy</u> <u>2020–2023</u>. They also form the basis of the annual <u>European Cancer Summit</u>.

ECO's Focused Topic Networks do not have a decision-making role on policy. Where policy needs are identified, our Member Societies can make proposals through our <u>policy approval pathway</u>. When policies have been agreed, our networks support their implementation.







ECO-ASCO Special Network: Impact of the War in Ukraine on Cancer

<u>The Special Network</u> was launched in March 2022 – at the direction of the European Cancer Organisation and the American Society of Clinical Oncology (<u>ASCO</u>) – as an urgent response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine.

The network brings together more than 300 organisations of experts and stakeholders from the global health community to support Ukrainian cancer patients and the health services across Europe that are now caring for them.

2022 Special Network activities included:

- Creating an information hub (onco-help.org) of available resources and links, in multiple languages, for Ukrainian cancer patients.
 Within one month of the start of the war, we had 30 countries included and saw a significant increase in web traffic, particularly from Ukraine and neighbouring countries.
- · Illustrating the tireless efforts of volunteers to support patients through first-person narratives.
- Gathering intelligence to inform our advocacy and policy work with the WHO and EU Commission, as well as cancer centres, healthcare professionals and patient organisations.
- Hosting a session "Supporting Ukrainian Cancer Patients and Cancer Services Immediate Needs and Longer-term Rebuilding" at the European Cancer Summit 2022.
- · Co-ordinating, communicating and connecting organisations and people within the Network.



Digital transformation will play a key role in meeting the world's post-pandemic challenges in healthcare, requiring policies to address critical issues on accessibility, data interoperability and digital literacy to ensure that no one is left behind.

2022 Network activities Included:

ECO's <u>Inequalities Network</u> Inequalities Network shines a bright light on readily available policy mechanisms to bridge gaps and raise standards and outcomes in cancer care across Europe – for all groups in society.

EU Health Commissioner Stella Kyriakides has emphasised that 'inequalities' will be a core theme throughout Europe's Beating Cancer Plan. As inequalities are transversal, careful attention is required to avoid duplication of effort with other networks.

2022 Network Activities Included:

- Highlighting specific inequalities related to: the East-West divide; gender; ethnicity; age; sexuality and identity; health literacy and patient education; and other marginalised groups.
- Providing input on ECO's recently launched <u>European Cancer Pulse</u>, a tool to help visualise cancer inequalities across and within
 countries, on: cancer burden; research spending; prevention efforts; early detection; diagnosis and treatment access; survivorship;
 and the impact of social determinants.
- Supporting the <u>National and European Parliamentarians for Cancer Action</u>, a group committed to tackling inequalities in cancer care on a national and European basis.
- · Publishing our report "Men and Cancer: Raising the Issues" after the Community 365 Roundtable Meeting on Men and Cancer.
- Showcasing our report "It Can Be Done Beating Inequalities in Cancer Care".
- Highlighting key recommendations of EU initiatives, including the Cancer Inequalities Registry.
- Collaborating with the OECD on the Cancer Inequalities Registry to ensure measurement of all inequalities that currently exist between (and within) European countries.
- Promoting health literacy to combat inequalities.
- Hosting a session "Action on Cancer Inequalities: Our Shared Roadmap" at the European Cancer Summit 2022.
- Holding the first informal meeting of the LGBTQI+ Workstream at the European Cancer Summit 2022.






Policy Decision-Making Process

MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

2022: Managing Change and Growth

The European Cancer Organisation (ECO) continued its growth in 2022 and it's been humbling to see the increased involvement our community is having in implementing cancer policy in Europe. As Andreas mentioned in his editorial above, our Member Societies encouraged us to get involved in co-ordinating new EU projects – a first for us. That meant hiring more staff in 2022, with more varied expertise, which in turn required moving to a larger office in Brussels.

It was a whirlwind year, to be sure. We found ourselves rapidly managing growth, not because we were looking to be a dominant organisation in cancer but because we feel a sense of responsibility. When opportunities arise, we respond. We must. The European cancer community cannot call for action, and when funding for that action materialises, then walk away. So, we are growing as requested by our Member Societies and working on projects on their behalf. But managing growth can be hard. When you build a new team, there are upsides and there are challenges getting up to speed in a complex area like cancer.

The operational side is the easy part. It's the people side which presents the hurdles. Cancer is a particularly complex stakeholder map. Just think of all the organisations represented under the ECO umbrella – the different Member Societies, patient advocacy groups, and focused topic networks – you're talking about hundreds of organisations. And each has its own passion, niche and expertise that need to be respected and reflected in what we do.

Now add to that new staff who may lack experience in the cancer landscape – or even for those who do have some experience – it can take at least a year for everyone to get a full

understanding of the wider picture. And building a team while delivering on tight timelines, as they are in EU funded projects, means that you are constantly adapting on the fly. It also means that you don't get every decision right.

What is paramount, however, is that throughout this growth period we maintain a dialogue with our Member Societies and patient groups. We are here to listen. We're not here to preach. So that any time our Member Societies or patient community needs us, we're available to them. And if there are questions, concerns, suggestions, our doors are always open. We're here. We're here to facilitate and coordinate, not to dictate and control. And sometimes for the community, on the back of Covid and recovering from the severe disruptions it created, just having the time to communicate can be a massive challenge.

There's no question: 2022 was a pivotal year for us. The community came together well. We began to see the light at the end of the tunnel after so many dark days of the pandemic. There's lots of hard work ahead, to be sure. But the key takeaway from our experience together in 2022, is that you can always count on us to support your organisation and your mission – because your mission is our mission.
